  - Making efficiency and effectiveness a reality
  - Implementing high-impact key services for citizens and businesses
  - Putting key enablers in place
  - Strengthening participation and democratic decision-making

    - especially regarding engineering and managing innovative services




#### Main themes of eGov research

- Engineering of innovative personal services for all
  - according to individual life events and situations
    - that will be trusted and easily accessible.
- Semantic Web and information management technologies
  - for eGovernment systems interoperability and interaction with and between citizens, business and public administrations;
- Advanced technologies
  - that will enable efficient and effective eGovernment
    - e.g. smart tags, sensors networks, advanced GPS, knowledge grid


